

February 6, 2024: Ballot drop boxes are opened throughout the State of California

March 5, 2024: Election Day (Polls Open 7 AM - 8 PM)

March 22, 2024: Registrar of Voters to certify election results


PARTY-NOMINATED OFFICES
Only voters who disclosed a preference upon registering to vote for the same party as the candidate seeking the nomination of any party for the Presidency or election to a party committee may vote for that candidate at the primary election, unless the party has adopted a rule to permit nonparty voters to vote in its primary elections.

VOTER-NOMINATED AND NONPARTISAN OFFICES
All voters, regardless of the party preference they disclosed upon registration, or refusal to disclose a party preference, may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated or nonpartisan office. The party preference, if any, designated by a candidate for a voter-nominated office is selected by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not imply that the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party or that the party approves of the candidate. The party preference, if any, of a candidate for a nonpartisan office does not apply on the ballot.



No Party Preference (NPP) Voters

If No Party Preference (NPP) Voters want to vote for U.S. President, they have TWO options:

1. Request a Crossover Party Ballot from the Mono County Elections Office with presidential candidates from one of the following parties:
 - American Independent Party
 - Democratic Party
 - Libertarian Party
2. To vote for the Green, Peace and Freedom, or Republican parties' presidential candidates, they must re-register with that specific party.

NOTICE: Any voter that has declined to disclose a political party preference on their voter registration may request a one-time ballot for a political party that is allowing cross-over voting in the presidential primary election.

I have declined to disclose a preference for a qualified political party. The below-listed political parties are allowing cross-over voting in this election. For the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election only, I request a ballot for the following political party (select only one):

WHO CAN USE THIS APPLICATION

If you are not registered to vote with any political party and you would like to vote for a presidential candidate of a political party allowing cross-over voting in the presidential primary election, you may use this application to request a political party's ballot.

How to Fill Out this Application

ITEM 1. Affirm that you are registered to vote and have not disclosed a political party preference and select the eligible political party whose ballot you would like to receive for the presidential primary election.

ITEM 2. Print your first, middle, and last names as they appear in your voter registration record.

ITEM 3. Print your date of birth in this order - month, day, year.

ITEM 4. Print the complete street address of your voting residence. A post office box or rural route cannot be accepted.

ITEM 5. Mailing address information must be completed by the voter. Print the complete address where you want your ballot sent if it is different than the residence address provided in Item 4.

ITEM 6. Sign and date in this order - month, day, year. No witness or notary required.

HOW TO SUBMIT THE APPLICATION

Your No Party Preference Cross-Over Ballot Notice and Application must be returned to your county elections official in person, by mail, email, or fax.

If this application is returned by mail, it must be returned directly to your county elections official.

Please do not send applications to the Secretary of State's office. Doing so will delay the application process.


Registered to Vote with a Qualified Political Party?

If you registered with any of the following qualified political parties, you can only vote for that party's presidential candidates:

- American Independent Party
- Democratic Party
- Green Party
- Libertarian Party
- Peace and Freedom Party
- Republican Party

If you want to vote for another party's presidential candidate, you must re-register with that specific party.

Misinformation / Disinformation



California Trusted Information

Mono County and the Secretary of State's Office is committed to ensuring that elections are free, fair, safe, secure, accurate, and accessible. California Trusted Information

Reality: You can vote for as many or as few contests as you choose.

Rumor: If I leave something blank on my ballot, my ballot will not be counted.

Facts: A blank contest on a ballot is known as an undervote. An undervote occurs when a voter intentionally or unintentionally does not vote in a specific contest. Properly marked votes on the ballot will then be counted. Democracy happens one contest at a time and every vote matters.

In addition, you can sign-up at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov to receive automatic email, SMS (text), or voice call notifications about your ballot's status.

Key Questions to Ask When Analyzing Media Messages

		SAMPLE QUESTIONS
AUTHORS & AUDIENCES	Authorship	Who made this?
	Purposes	Why was this made? What does this want me to do? Who is the target audience? Who are they talking to? or Who is this for?
	Economics	Who paid for this?
	Responses	What actions might I take in response to this message? How might I participate productively? How does this make me feel and how do my emotions influence my interpretation of this?

Key Questions to Ask When Analyzing Media Messages

MESSAGES & MEANINGS	Content	<p>What does this want me to think (or think about)?</p> <p>What would someone learn from this?</p> <p>What ideas, values, information, or points of view are overt?</p> <p>Implied?</p> <p>What is left out that might be important to know?</p>
	Techniques	<p>What techniques are used and why?</p> <p>How do the techniques communicate this message?</p>
	Interpretations	<p>How might different people understand this message differently?</p> <p>What is my interpretation and what do I learn about myself from my reaction or interpretation?</p>

Key Questions to Ask When Analyzing Media Messages

REPRESENTATIONS & REALITY	Context	When was this made? Where or how was it shared with the public?
	Credibility	Is this fact, opinion, or something else? How credible is this (and how do you know)? What are the sources of the information, ideas, or assertions? Can I trust this source to tell me the truth about this topic?
